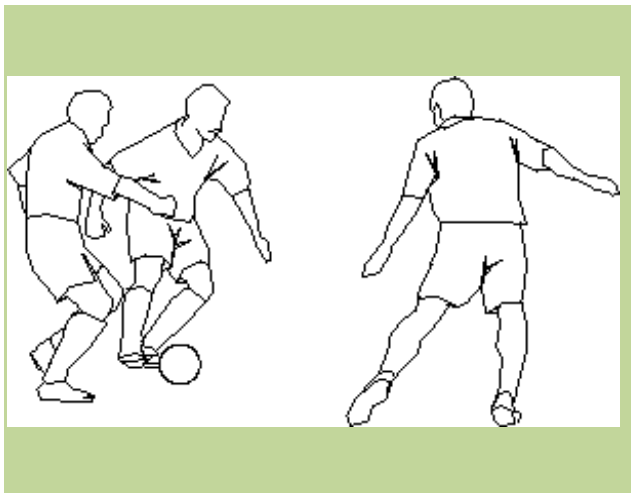
*My favourite soccer player is Karim Benzema. This football player is one of the best-known football players in the world. He has a height of 187cm and weighs 79 kilos.

Of course, there are many other things that could be taken into consideration.

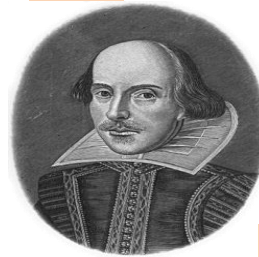
*For example, the Royal House is called the Royal House of Windsor and the people belonging to it can trace their bloodlines back through thousands of years of monarchy and leadership. They go by the terms "His and Her Royal Highness," yet they are admired for their style, down-to-earth personalities, media savvy, and their devotion to humanitarian causes.

When the Queen is in London, she stays at Buckingham Palace, but there are other royal residences in the UK. Windsor Castle is the oldest royal residence still in use. William the Conqueror built the castle in 1080 and it has remained a royal palace and fortress

for over 900 years. The grounds include several homes, a large church and the royal palace. Situated 20 miles west of London, it is also the weekend home of Queen Elizabeth II.



* When somebody starts learning English, he or she will eventually become familiar with some aspects related to the life and work of William Shakespeare. He was an English poet, playwright and actor, widely regarded as the greatest writer in the English language and the world's pre-eminent dramatist. He is often called England's national poet, and the "Bard of Avon".



His plays have been translated into every major living language and are performed more often than those of any other playwright.

* Many of us have watched on television recipes cooked by Jamie Oliver. He is a famous English chef who has tried to change the eating habits of his fellow citizens. But there is another famous British culinary aspect: the Full English breakfast.

The term full comes from the fact the breakfast is full of different food stuff. Breakfast may begin with orange juice, cereals, stewed or fresh fruits but the heart of the Full breakfast is bacon and eggs accompanied by sausages, grilled tomato, mushrooms, tea, toast and marmalade.

A Full English Breakfast may also have Black Pudding, Baked Beans, and Fried Bread.

*A lot of tourists visiting the United Kingdom are impressed by the vast number of monuments, some of them dating back from Antiquity or the Middle



Ages. One of the most visited places is Stonehenge; the place was built by the late Neolithic people around 5000 years ago, about 3000 BC. People probably gathered there for religious ceremonies.

* London, the capital of the country is one of the most visited cities in the entire world. A very famous landmark which appears on all postcards is the Big Ben. That is the nickname for the Great Bell of the clock at the north end of the Palace of Westminster in London and the term is usually extended to refer to both the clock and the clock tower as well. A British cultural icon, the tower is one of the most prominent symbols of the

United Kingdom and it often appears in the films set in London.

*We all know that the British people drink a lot of tea. Perhaps surprisingly, this is a relatively new tradition. While the custom of drinking tea dates back to the third millennium BC in China and was popularised in England during the 1660s by King Charles II and his wife the Portuguese Infanta Catherine de Braganza, it was not until the mid 19th century that the concept of 'afternoon tea' first appeared.

Afternoon tea was introduced in England by Anna, the seventh Duchess of Bedford, in the year 1840. The Duchess would become hungry around four o'clock in the afternoon. The evening meal in her household was served fashionably late at eight o'clock, thus leaving a long period of time between lunch and dinner. The Duchess asked that a tray of tea, bread and butter (some time earlier, the Earl of Sandwich had had the idea of putting a filling between two slices of bread) and cake be brought to her room during the late afternoon. This became a habit of hers and she began inviting friends to join her.



Romania

Did You Know ?

*The name "Romania" comes from the Latin word "Romanus" which means "citizen of the Roman Empire."

*The Bicz Gorges offer a unique view of the Ceahlau Mountain. The Bicz Gorges are famous for their 1000 ft. limestone rocks towering over narrow roads and passes.

The road that slices through the Bicz Gorges (Cheile Bicazului) is among Romania's most stunning and spectacular. The park's main attraction is the Red Lake (Lacul Rosu), created in 1837 after a major natural landslide.

*Romanian Inventor Traian Vuia was the first European to built and fly a fully self-propelled, fixed-wing 'automobile airplane' (March 18, 1906).

*The Romanian city of Timisoara was the first in Europe to have electric street-lighting (in 1889).

Timisoara was also the first European city to introduce horse-drawn trams, in 1869.

*Romanian is one of the five languages in which religious services are performed in the autonomous monastic state of Mount Athos (Greece).

*The name of the Romanian currency "Leu" (lion in English) and the U.S.

currency "Dollar" share the same origin: the Dutch coin "löwentaler". The Romanian Leu (plural Lei) got its name after the roaring lion (löwen) engraved on the tail of the löwentaler while the US Dollar was named after the second part of the Dutch coin 'taler' (pronounced *daler* and meaning silver coin).

* The Danube Delta is a wildlife enthusiast's paradise (especially a bird watchers). It is home to the world's largest reed bed and hosts rare species of plants and animals, including endangered sturgeon, otters, wildcats and European mink.

Three clay tablets, dated to around 5300 BC, discovered in the village of Tartaria



(central Romania), have been the subject of considerable controversy among archaeologists, some of whom claim that the symbols represent the earliest known form of writing in the world.

With an area of 92,043 square miles (238,391 square kilometer), Romania is the largest country in Southeastern Europe. It is roughly the same size as the United Kingdom.
